## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

We are pleased to welcome Dr. Harriet Crawford as a co-opted member of Council and Dr. Jeremy Black as nominated representative of the Board of Oriental Studies of Oxford University. Drs. Stephanie Dalley and Michael Rogers have also been co-opted following Dr. Black's nomination and Dr. Rogers' resignation as representative of the Royal Society for Asian Affairs.

Dr. Edmond Sollberger has retired from the Council. Thanks are due to him for his support for the School over many years.

The Annual General Meeting was held on 25th November 1987. Following the meeting Dr. Jeremy Black, Director, lectured on "The Slain Heroes: some monsters of Ancient Mesopotamia".

The Bonham Carter Memorial lecture for 1987 was given by Professor W. G. Lambert on 4th June under the title "Who were the Assyrians?"

During the year the School has published the third fascicule of its series Abu Salabikh Excavations, subtitled Catalogue of Early Dynastic Pottery, by Jane Moon. It deals with pottery of the Early Dynastic period excavated at Abu Salabikh between 1975 and 1983. Pottery of other periods will be dealt with separately.

The School has entered into an agreement with Aris and Phillips Ltd. for the publication of future excavation reports under the title of *Iraq Archaeological Reports*: it is hoped that this arrangement will ensure the elimination of costly publication subsidies.

In June 1987 the School was pleased to be able to play its part in welcoming Dr. Mu'ayyad Sa'id Damerji, Director-General of the Iraqi Department of Antiquities and Heritage, who was making a two-week visit to the U.K. under the sponsorship of the British Council. It presented an opportunity to give practical expression to our gratitude for the continuing support and co-operation which we receive from the Iraqi authorities for the British Archaeological Expedition to Iraq's programme of excavation and research. He was entertained by members of Council on visits to Cambridge, Oxford and Edinburgh.

Dr. Jeremy Black resigned as the Director of the British Archaeological Expedition to Iraq in January 1988 on his appointment to a Lectureship in Akkadian at Oxford University. Mr. Roger Matthews, previously Secretary-Librarian, was appointed as the next Director with effect from 1st March; he was married to Miss Wendy Knight in Baghdad in March 1988.

In Iraq the School continued its work in the North Jezirah, the area which is to be extensively developed agriculturally using the waters from the new Saddam Dam on the Tigris. Much of the area is already criss-crossed by new irrigation channels. The School continues to support the archaeological rescue project organised by the Iraqi Department of Antiquities and Heritage. In the autumn the

Assistant Director, Mr. Warwick Ball, conducted a two-month season of excavations at Tell Hawa, which had been surveyed in detail in 1986. These preliminary excavations have revealed traces of a late Assyrian brick platform or ziggurat and an associated destruction level. Inscriptions found referred to the Assyrian king Shalmaneser III and to the god Adad. At the same time Dr. Tony Wilkinson continued his survey in the vicinity around Tell Hawa, extending his previous plans of sites and "hollow ways" and adding to our understanding of the growth of occupation in this area. Stuart and Bronwell Campbell conducted excavations on two small prehistoric sites in the area.

The 1988 season at Abu Salabikh was directed by Mr. Nicholas Postgate with Mr. Roger Matthews as Assistant Director. The surface clearance programme continued while excavation concentrated on the two large ED III houses on the main mound in one of which were found two largely undisturbed burials and four cuneiform tablets of ED III date. The city wall was sectioned on the west side of the main mound and the investigation of an industrial area and a city gate in Area A was begun. Mr. Tony Wilkinson carried out a geomorphological survey of the site.

Professor David Oates directed another season of excavations at Tell Brak in the spring of 1988. The major discovery was a new building of the Akkadian period, possibly having a ceremonial function and incorporating a small temple.

The Director, Dr. Jeremy Black, before leaving Baghdad in January 1988 completed work on copies of literary texts from Nimrud for publication in the next volume of *Cuneiform Texts from Nimrud*. During the year he visited East Berlin as a British Academy exchange visitor and Toronto as a Visiting Fellow of the Royal Inscriptions of Mesopotamia project.

The Assistant Director, Mr. Warwick Ball, was occupied throughout the year with excavations and publication preparation concerning the North Jezirah Project.

The Secretary-Librarian, Mr. Roger Matthews, continued his studies of third millennium clay sealings and sealing techniques, also visiting collections in Berlin, Oxford and London, and expects to present the results of his researches as a Ph.D. dissertation at Cambridge in the autumn of 1988. He has begun planning a future programme of excavations at Jemdet Nasr.

Mr. Tony Wilkinson was appointed as the School Fellow for the year. In addition to his work in the North Jezirah he took part in the spring season at Abu Salabikh and surveyed a large area around the Sumerian city to identify settlement patterns.

In the School's programme for Visiting Scholars Professor David Oates and Dr. Joan Oates visited Iraq in December 1987. They were able to review current work on prehistoric archaeology in Iraq and to inspect the School's work in the North Jezirah. Dr. Erica

Hunter (Cambridge University) was enabled to study Syriac magical bowls in the Iraq Museum and met with considerable encouragement for her work.

Professor David Oates, Dr. Joan Oates and Professor W. G. Lambert, a member of the Council, also attended the cultural festival at Babylon in October 1987 at the invitation of the Iraqi authorities.

Travel grants were made to Miss Lucy Blue (to take part in the Tell al-Hawa excavations), Mr. Stuart Campbell (to work on chalcolithic sites in the North Jezirah), Mr. Andrew Fisher (to act as the School's illustrator), Miss Helen McDonald (to work on material from the Tell al-Hawa excavations), Miss Leah McKenzie (Australia) (to study material remains of the Seleucid era), Mr. Andrew Petersen (to undertake a survey of Islamic sites in the area of Ukhaidhir), Miss Louise Scott (to undertake a survey of Islamic sites in the area of Ukhaidhir and to research Nineveh excavations), Mr. Nigel Sadler (to work on Ninevite 5 material in the North Jezirah), Mr. David Tucker (to take part in the North Jezirah survey).

The imminent expiry of the lease on the Expedition's present premises in Baghdad, the regular infestation of those premises by termites, and the need to provide more adequate accommodation for married employees led to the search for new premises in Baghdad. We shall move to a more satisfactory house in the autumn. The new address will be 34/3/609 Mansour. The telephone number is unchanged.

Transport within Iraq continues to be a major cause for concern. The School's staff and students have been involved in two serious accidents. Two of the School's vehicles have continued to be kept out of service because of customs regulations. It is hoped that this issue will be settled shortly.

The School is as always conscious of its debt of gratitude to the Iraqi Department of Antiquities and Heritage, and in particular to its Director, Dr. Mu'ayyad Sa'id Damerji, for their constant support and practical co-operation.

We must once again thank the British Academy for their generous financial assistance to the School. We continue to keep a close watch on expenditure, and, thanks in part to a fall in the Iraqi dinar against Sterling, have been able to reduce expenses in Baghdad. In London, rising costs have obliged us to increase the annual subscription from £15 to £20 with effect from January 1989. On the other hand, in the last year we were able to obtain substantial support for our excavations from outside sources and expenditure on special publications was reduced. As a result we were able to restore to some extent the balance on our Special Publications and Excavations Fund, making it possible for us to plan a wider range of excavations in the next year or two.
