# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

THANKS to generous financial support from the Metropolitan Museum, New York, it was possible to continue digging at Nimrud on a large scale for a third season. A preliminary account of these discoveries appeared in the *Illustrated London News* of July 28th and August 4th, 1951, and further articles will appear in *Iraq*. The monumental character of the Assyrian Palaces and the wide variety of the antiquities recovered attracted over 1,400 visitors to the site during March and April.

One of the most remarkable finds was a sandstone stele erected by King Assur-nasir-pal II in 879 B.C. to commemorate the completion of his Palace. The carved front of this stele shows the king in his ceremonial robes, with the symbols of the principal Assyrian gods. On three sides are 154 lines recording a census of the population, and a list of the *flora* and *fauna* within the precincts of the city.

The Expedition also discovered a heavy stone defensive gateway built by this king in the eastern wall of the city, and a cobbled street in which the tracks made by ancient Assyrian chariot-wheels can still be discerned.

Two of the palaces yielded hundreds of ivories of the ninth and eighth centuries B.C., many of them exquisitely carved. The richest group is from a building which has been named the 'Burnt Palace' because it was sacked and burnt, possibly in 705 B.C. It may prove to be the second largest palace on the mound. Only seven rooms could be excavated, and there is every prospect of further important discoveries here, as well as in the older north-western palace, the plan of which is still far from being fully recovered. The work will be continued early next year.

Lectures on the activities of the School were given in Baghdad at a meeting organised by the British Council, and to the Iraq Academy. Lantern slides illustrated the work at Nimrud.

Thanks are due to many persons for the generous financial support which made the excavations possible. In addition to

the Metropolitan Museum, we received grants from the Iraq Petroleum Company; the Griffith Institute and Ashmolean Museum, Oxford; Cambridge University; Penguin Books Ltd.; and two anonymous American donors. Imperial Chemical Industries furnished Perspex roofing for the protection of the Assyrian Palaces, and the Iraq Petroleum Company machinery for the removal of dumps.

By permission of the Trustees, Mr. D. J. Wiseman, O.B.E., of the Egyptian and Assyrian Department, British Museum, took part in the expedition and deciphered the inscriptions. The other individual members of the staff assisting in a highly successful season's work are too numerous to mention here, but will be recorded in *Iraq*. We tender warm thanks to H.E. Dr. Naji al Asil, Director General of the Iraq Antiquities Department, no less than to Professor Mallowan's skilled Iraqi colleagues in Baghdad and Mosul.

In the course of the year the School provided accommodation in Baghdad and Nimrud for thirty scholars from England, Australia, the United States, France, Holland and Switzerland. Oxford, Cambridge and London Universities and the Institut français d'Archéologie were all represented. During the summer the house was occupied by Professor Cameron and his staff from the Department of Near Eastern Studies, University of Michigan. The library was also available to Iraqi scholars whom we had the pleasure of entertaining at various times.

The accounts are annexed. The Council are glad to report that Parliament has this year increased to £4,500 the grant to the School. With more money the School could expand its work, and it would make good use of subscriptions, donations or bequests.
