REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

At the Annual General Meeting on 10th December Dr Rob Carter gave a lecture entitled "Ubaid-period trade and seafaring in the Arabian Gulf: the view from H3, Kuwait". On 13th March 2003, Dr Roger Moorey lectured on "Cylinder seals and terracottas: portable pictures in Babylonia (c. 2150-1650 BC)". After the lecture, the President of the School presented the Gertrude Bell Memorial Gold Medal of the British School of Archaeology in Iraq to Dr Moorey FBA for his outstanding services to Mesopotamian Archaeology. This medal has only been awarded three previous times to, Professor Sir Max Mallowan (1976); Professor Seton Lloyd (1979) and Professor David Oates (1997). Dr Jane Moon OBE delivered the twenty-first Bonham Carter Lecture on 12th June entitled "Looking for more of Dilmun: excavations at Saar, Bahrain 1990-99".

At the AGM in December 2002, three veteran Council members stepped down, following Council's policy of rotation after two terms: Dr Collon, Sir Stephen Egerton KCMG and Professor Postgate, all of whom have made outstanding contributions to the work of the School over many years. We are pleased that Sir Stephen stays with us in his role of Vice President and as a co-opted member of our Development Committee and that Dr Collon has agreed to continue her valuable work as co-editor of the journal *Iraq* and chair of our Publications Committee. Dr Clayden decided to stand down as his work keeps him out of England at the moment. We were very fortunate in being able to welcome back to the Council: Dr Curtis from the British Museum, Dr Herrmann, well known for her work on the Nimrud ivories, and Dr Black, who is a former director of the School in Baghdad. It is also a pleasure to welcome Sir Terence Clark, formerly British Ambassador to Iraq, who joins the Council for the first time. The Council warmly congratulates Dr Curtis on recently being elected a Fellow of the British Academy.

On the wider world-scale 2003 was a tragic year for the heritage of Iraq and Mesopotamian archaeology with the looting of the Iraq Museum during the spring war and the continued systematic looting of sites within Iraq. The School, together with scholars across the world, made every efforts to warn governments and the military authorities of the dangers prior to the conflict. Some of the priceless stolen pieces have been recovered but much is still lost. Helen McDonald, the BSAI's Senior Research Fellow, spent the summer months in Iraq, assisting in the reconstruction process along with Sarah Collins of the British Museum and colleagues from DCMS, all on secondment to the CPA (initially ORHA) with the help of the FCO. The security situation and a degree of administrative confusion made the work extremely difficult (see more details in Ms McDonald's report in BSAI Newsletter No. 12). The School started a 'Fund for Iraq' to enable us to respond to immediate needs and is extremely grateful to its members and two major outside donors in enabling us to raise just over £17,500. We were able to provide a

stereoscopic microscope to the Iraq Museum, which went out with the British Museum team in the summer. We have also provided some very important reference books, such as missing volumes of the Chicago Assyrian Dictionary for the universities in Mosul and Baghdad. It is hoped to use part of the balance of the fund for a training & education programme.

Your School remains committed to returning to Iraq in some form as soon as it is feasible to do so.

The School was one of the institutional sponsors of the 49e Rencontre Assyriologique Internationale which took place in London 7-11 July 2003 at the British Museum and the School of Oriental & African Studies. Over 600 Assyriologists and Near Eastern archaeologists attended the RAI 49 on the occasion of the museum's 250th anniversary. In addition to papers on the main theme, Nineveh, there were workshops on the Ur III period and on ancient Mesopotamian medicine and other papers devoted to new developments in research and in the field. Time was found for discussion of the recent looting of the Iraq Museum and its aftermath. Colonel Matthew Bogdanos, who was in charge of the investigation of the thefts and looting of the Iraq Museum, made a surprise appearance at the conclusion of the meetings. He spoke for nearly an hour on the results of the Joint Inter-Agency Co-ordination Group investigating the thefts at the Iraq Museum, which ran from 22 April to 8 July 2003. Council wishes to thank Professor Andrew George, the British Museum Staff and the Organising Committee for all their hard work in putting together this very successful conference.

The excavation and study season planned at Tell Brak in the spring of 2003 had to be postponed owing to the Iraq situation; a study season is now planned for spring 2004. In the autumn of 2002 a new project was initiated, an intensive survey of the Brak sustaining area designed to last for four autumn seasons. This is being carried out under the overall direction of Professor Oates with Professor Henry Wright as Field Director. With the cooperation and encouragement of the Directorate-General in Damascus, the 2002 season took place under the excavation permit and with an initial survey radius of 7 km from Brak itself. The survey is using both Landsat multispectral imagery and the older Corona images, GIS handheld receivers and the latest GIS software together with more conventional archaeological and geomorphological techniques. Material from all periods is being recorded, and the survey is relying on the evidence of botanists and faunal and other specialists whose work on material from the excavations provides the basic economic and environmental framework within which the survey data will be interpreted. The overall purpose is to attempt to understand changing patterns of settlement and land use in the hinterland of Brak from both regional and local perspectives.

The new satellite imagery and software enable the identification of even small settlement scatters, including sites that have been completely destroyed by ploughing. In the first season (2002) 136 sites were recorded, 80 more than had previously been identified in the immediate neighbourhood of Brak. An extensive report on the first season was presented to the Directorate-General last summer, who have now authorised an extension of the survey to a limit of 20 km from Brak, enabling a much wider examination of changing settlement density and stratification within this larger area, and in which it is hoped to collaborate with our Russian and Italian colleagues working at Khazna and Tell Barri. The survey team have also been asked by the Directorate General to include younger members of their staff on the survey team for training in the new survey techniques. In the current season an intensive survey, on foot, of the immediate environs of Brak has revealed, inter alia, an unexpected quantity of Late Bronze Age material. Ms Helen McDonald, Co-Field Director of the Tell Brak Excavations, is currently part of the survey team and will also take charge of the spring study season. She continues to receive support from the School through a grant from the Fieldwork funds as the School's Senior Research Fellow.

Dr Augusta McMahon reports the Spring 2003 season of excavations at Chagar Bazar regrettably were cancelled because of the political situation in the region and possible security risk. Much progress was made in processing the results of the 1999-2002 seasons for publication, and she hopes to reschedule the season for the spring of 2004.

The School provided further support to the British Archaeological Expedition to es-Sabiyah, Kuwait at H3, with a grant to Dr Heiko Kallweit for work on the remaining pieces of chipped and ground stone from the site. The chipped stone industry represents the largest class of finds (more that 50,000 pieces). This corpus is unique for the Gulf as it includes flint scatters from in situ manufacture of tools & micro fragments retrieved from wet sieving. These provide new and important data on manufacturing techniques. Major excavations at the site of H3 are now complete and work is under way on preparation of the final publication. Excavation has established the significance of the site for a reassessment of the Neolithic cultures of the Eastern Arabian littoral. A new c14 date confirms that stock-herding dates back to the sixth millennium BCE and by the late sixth millennium the inhabitants of the site had developed a distinctive architecture, a sophisticated flint technology and a bead manufacturing industry all of which are distinctively Arabian. In addition the site has provided us with new evidence on the relationship between Ubaid Mesopotamia and the Gulf throwing new light on the nature of that relationship.

The School provided additional grants in 2002/2003 to: Dr Jon Taylor for study of original standard Babylonian lexical lists in Aleppo from excavations at Emar; to Dr John MacGinnis for travel to the excavations at Ziyaret Tepe, in south-eastern

Turkey, where he is responsible for the excavations of the Lower Town (substantial Late Assyrian building has been discovered); to Dr Farouk Al Rawi for the final phase of the 'Umma Project', which involves copying Umma texts of the Ur III period in the British Museum, which will be published; to Dr Georgina Herrmann for continuation of the 'Nimrud Ivories Project'. Two new aspects of the ivory programme have been made possible by advances in computer technology with a scanning programme, undertaken by H. Coffey and S. Laidlaw, and a database of the ivories by J. Picton. The scanning programme began with recording the photographs of the North West Palace ivories and was expanded to include ivories from Room SW11/12, and subsequently the ivories that were published in the last three volumes of Ivories from Nimrud (III-V): these are scanned from the original photographs rather than the published images. Altogether, this will make available a huge archive of images for the next generation of ivory studies. The scanned images will be made available by the School on CD or DVD with a 'handbook' of 'thumb-nail'sized images for ease of reference. Even prior to completion the value of such images is evident, for they are being made available to the database of material lost from the Iraq Museum.

The School's Publication programme in 2002/2003 included: Excavations at Tell Brak. Vol. 4: Exploring a Regional Centre in Upper Mesopotamia, 1994-1996 by R. Matthews (ed.) published jointly with the McDonald Institute for Archaeological Research, Cambridge. Ancient Settlement in the Zammar Region - Excavations by the British Archaeological Expedition to Iraq in the Saddam Dam Salvage Project, 1985-86 Volume One by Warwick Ball (ed.), BAR (British Archaeological Reports) title from Archaeopress published in association with the British School of Archaeology in Iraq.

As the 2002/2003 accounts show, our income rose last year due to the large increase in publication sales, reflecting the increase in School publications over the past few years, as well as an increase in the School's regular grant from the British Academy. This income rise was offset by a continued large commitment to fieldwork and research. In addition a significant unrealised loss on our COIF endowment fund meant that the financial year ended with a decrease in our reserves. However, we believe that our reserves continue to be maintained at a satisfactory level for the operation of the School. We remain grateful for the continuing support, which the Academy gives the School.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2003

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- a) The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting principles under the historical cost convention, modified by the revaluation of investments.
- b) Direct currency conversions are translated at the exchange rate at the time of transaction, other balances are converted at year-end rates, any difference arising on exchange is written off in the year concerned.
- c) The School's financial statements have been prepared to comply with "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" the 'Statement of Recommended Practice' (SORP), produced by the Charity Commission in October 2000 and thus with the accounting requirements of the Charities Act 1993.
- d) Investments are included at market value. All other assets are included at cost or net realisable value, if lower.
- e) Grants are included in the Accounts in the period to which they relate.
- f) The School owns a collection of tablets and ivories from its excavations. These are on deposit with the British Museum at present and are not included in the Accounts.

g) STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of its financial activities for that period. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to:

- (i) select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- (ii) make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- (iii) state whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the appropriate SORP on Accounting by Charities and the Accounting Regulations and with applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and
- (iv) prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose, with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity, and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with applicable Accounting Standards and Statements of Recommended Practice and the regulations made under s44 of the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud or other irregularities.
